

WHO IS THIS RISEN SAVIOUR?

Every day of the month of May is part of the season on Easter. The greatest festival of Christian year last through Ascension (Thurs 29th) all the way to Pentecost (Sun 8th June). During this season we take time to read how the Lord Jesus appeared to his disciples after he had risen from the dead, and then the readings switch to things that Jesus said about his own identity: "I am the Good



Shepherd" (May 11th), and his parting 'new commandment' that we should love one another (May 18th).

Selecting a little graphic for this page was an interesting exercise. As usual, I went to Google images and searched for 'Face of Jesus' black and white clipart'. There were literally hundreds of choices – many picturing Jesus with his Good Friday crown of thorns, but plenty of others that were perhaps more appropriate for Easter. But then I had to choose! Which one was right for the magazine, and relatable. And, of course, this raises the question 'Who is Jesus to Jesus to you? Just a historic figure? But which part of his history speaks to you? Do you prefer a cartoon, an abstract, or one peeping over a wall, or one wearing sunglasses? There are certain things we can know about Jesus historically, and certain things we can't. So, we have to know him by faith, too, and there's a classic theological tension between the Jesus of history and the Christ of Faith. The jeopardy in that tension is that we make him who we want him to be. That's why it's worth reading what the bible says and sharing thoughts with others who read and who believe... and all that is the reason for Church.

Please note that, on Sunday 18th May, there is just one service – at Plaxtol at 10.30am a chance to be all together. We will welcome a guest preacher, Rev Dr Adrian Chatfield, and celebrate together the risen Lord who meets us in word and sacrament, and in one another. (There will also be cake and 'bubbles' for a significant birthday of a certain local clergyman!) All welcome, as always.

Thursday 1 May	Circular walk from Tatsfield with wonderful views over the Weald and the City of London between the highest points of the North Downs at Botley Hill and Betsom Hill. Walk through beech woods, open pasture and across a Roman Road. Short break at the Coccolith, part of the North Downs Way Art Trail. Quiet lanes. One or two short climbs; moderate difficulty.	5.6 miles
Sunday 4 May	Leisurely circular walk from Peckham Bush through East Peckham and following the River Medway to Yalding, returning via Yalding Fen. Several stiles; a mostly flat walk with a very gentle incline up to Peckham Bush.	6 miles
Thursday 8 May	Leisurely walk along the Greensand Way from Linton church, taking in the deer park, goat sanctuary, orchards and some lovely views of the Kent countryside. A few stiles and some quiet lane walking, but most of the walk is on easy tracks. There is a gentle climb with a short, steep stretch towards the end.	6.6 miles
Sunday 11 May	Undulating walk around Plaxtol and Gover Hill. Moderate difficulty.	5.5 miles
Sunday 18 May	Circular walk from Westwell winery near Charing. We start with a short climb to the North Downs Way and then climb further on woodland-edge tracks, passing the Kent Gliding Club. Heading downhill, we join the Pilgrims Way near Dunn Street. Walking above the vineyards we head into Charing village via Pett Place. We return to the winery alongside the Alderbed Meadow, a special landscape of wet grassland and alder woodland. Moderate difficulty.	6.5 miles

Hall Repairs

Over the past month or so, we have undertaken a number of general repairs to the hall, easing doors, filling and painting walls and doors that have deteriorated and generally freshening the interior.

New blinds and curtains have been fitted which have made a big improvement.

We have now also ordered four new replacement windows for the main hall, which is excellent news. The existing windows have all rotted and are beyond repair. Due to the hall's Grade II listing, the new windows must be like for like. The replacements are therefore a major expense and it has taken some considerable time to source them.

We hope the work will be carried out sometime in June.

The next challenge is to tackle the heating. The existing system is not fit for purpose and hugely expensive to run and consideration has to be given to the issue of insulation.

FROM YOUR LOCAL MP

While we're enjoying a perfect Spring and getting ready for the County elections on Thursday 1 May (don't forget to vote!), many are worried about their safety and their children. I usually write about what I'm doing locally in but this time I thought I would branch out and tell you a bit about what else I think matters.

Over the past five years I've been to Ukraine many times. I'll be going again soon because what is going on in the East affects us all in the West. We know that the full-scale Russian invasion, now in its third year, is killing children every day. We also know that it is costing us all. So it's worth remembering why it matters.

PLANT A TREE, LOVE A LAWN & CAPTURE CARBON

By planting a tree – or trees – and laying or maintaining a lawn those us with a garden can make a significant contribution to removing CO2 from the atmosphere. Trees store more carbon than grassland in most situations but both can play an important role in reducing global warming with the added benefit of increasing biodiversity.

There are few gardens that cannot be enhanced with the right tree in the right place. It is often thought that some gardens are too small for a tree. Counter-intuitively - from a design point of view a large tree can often make a small garden seem larger.

Admittedly an oak tree would be far too large for the average domestic sized garden but there are smaller species – cherry, birch, maple or juniper - that will capture carbon effectively. And if a garden is truly only a pocket handkerchief then a tree grown in a pot - or trained against a wall - can do its part.

Those of us with a lawn are also – possibly unconsciously – making a difference to the net carbon emissions of this country. Grass absorbs carbon dioxide during its growth and stores it in different tissues. It can also be stored in the stalks and roots of wildflowers that grow in the turf. The carbon dioxide removed from the atmosphere is therefore held – captured - in the solid mass of soil that lies beneath our grass sward. Our lawn is in effect a valuable carbon sink.

Mosses also capture carbon dioxide through photosynthesis reducing atmospheric levels of the gas - the main contributor to the greenhouse effect – which causes global warming. If we could only learn to love the moss that grows in many of our shaded lawns that would further increase carbon capture and also play an important role in retaining rainwater - so decreasing water run off – an essential consideration when our weather is increasingly extreme.

And, of course, every tree, shrub, hedge and perennial that is planted needs and absorbs water. And if that is not tap water but rainwater and we have fitted money-saving rainwater butts to each downpipe for garden use, then that too is saving the environment and reducing run-off.

Talking of run-off - the cause of so much of our recent flooding – front gardens replaced by an impermeable surface adds to it.

Laying a permeable surface – often only gaps between paving qualifies - means that rainwater can filter down and be absorbed into the soil which will obviously benefit our planting as well as relieving storm drains and rivers from flooding.

By adapting our own personal outdoor space we can make a significant contribution - both individually and collectively - to mitigate climate change. No flogging, no gnashing of teeth or beating of chests - if only it was all so simple!

MAY AT SHIPBOURNE FARMERS MARKET (Local produce made/grown by Local producers)

Shipbourne Farmers' Market stallholder Tom Cannon from **Roughway Farm** recently appeared on BBC2 as part of Michael Portillo's new series of "Great British Railway Journeys". Tom and his Uncle Giles showed Michael around the farm, roasted cobnuts and chatted about Tom's Grandpa, John Cannon MBE, and his important role in cobnut growing - in Michael's words "a legend in the cobnut world". The series is available to watch on BBC iPlayer (*Tom features in episode 2 – Hildenborough to Robertsbridge*).

With the longer days and the warmer spring sunshine the first signs of the bounty to come has arrived. **Asparagus**, one of the great treats of the season. It is at its best when picked and cooked within hours, something easily achievable when bought locally at the market. Make the most of the delicate flavour by serving simply steamed with melted butter or a hollandaise sauce. As the season progresses use in risottos, tarts, salads and soups.

Will's wild sea trout is one of the season's great treats and lemon sole, cod, halibut and sea bass are all good at this time of year.

Beef and pork will be at their most succulent as the grazing starts to green up. Now is the time to splash out on steaks, chops and fillets and use them simply cooked – grilled, stir fried or griddle cooked for lighter meals.

Alongside asparagus other spring vegetables are also starting to appear after the cold of the winter. Look out for tender little early **new potatoes**, leaves such as **spinach**, **watercress**, **rocket** and **lettuces** can now be found sitting alongside the last of this year's main vegetable crop of purple sprouting broccoli, spring cabbage, cauliflower, spring greens, spring onions and radishes. **Radishes**, **spring onions and samphire** mean that lighter eating is now an easy choice for the cook.

By the end of the month the earliest **gooseberries** should be available, ready to pair up with their perfect partner – delicate fragrant elderflowers. Just add a head or two of creamy white flowers (pick away from roads or sprayed fields and shake to remove bugs) to the gooseberries for a few minutes as they cook then lift out and discard. The distinctive flavour will remain for crumbles, cakes, fools or creamy desserts such as crème brûlée and panna cotta.

COOKERY CORNER

ASPARAGUS AND MUSHROOMS ON SOURDOUGH

Serves 4 / 20 mins / Super Easy

- 4 cloves of garlic
- Olive or rapeseed oil
- 4 slices of sourdough bread
- 2 handfuls of mushrooms
- 500g fresh asparagus
- 1 small handful of fresh flat-leave parsley
- 8 tbsps Worcestershire sauce
- 1-2 knobs of butter
- 1. Peel and finely slice 4 cloves of garlic. Put a large frying pan on a high heat and add a good lug of olive or rapeseed oil. Put 4 slices of sourdough bread into the toaster.
- 2. Slice 2 handfuls of clean mushrooms and 500g of washed asparagus (woody ends snapped off) into bite-sized chunks. Add them to the hot pan with the sliced garlic and toss and fry for around 4 minutes.
- 3. Finely chop a small handful of fresh flat-leaf parsley and add most of it to the pan, along with 8 tablespoons of Worcestershire sauce and a knob or two of butter. Take the pan off the heat and shake and stir around for 30 seconds or until the sauce has reduced down.
- 4. Season to taste, then spoon over the slices of hot toast and top with the rest of the parsley.
