

CONCLAVE (A REAL ONE!)

In February's edition I reflected on having been to see the Oscarwinning film 'Conclave' - a drama based on the novel around the business of how the Roman Catholic Church chooses a new Pope. And during May, Pope Francis died, and the Curia (College of cardinals) have met in conclave and duly elected their next leader, Pope Leo XIV.



The Church of England was prompt in publishing a prayer for Pope Leo, and we used it on the first Sunday after his election, which happened to be 'Good Shepherd' Sunday. Here's the prayer. It's a good one. Anyone can use it!

Almighty God, shepherd and guardian of all, we pray for your servant Pope Leo. Grant him grace to follow in the footsteps of the Good Shepherd, to preach the Gospel with boldness, to build up your people in unity and peace, and to serve them with humility and love; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

In the same spirit of new beginnings, both our parishes have now completed their Annual Parochial Church meeting and so have newly elected Parochial Church Councils. In my remarks to both meeting I said that my recent birthday signals the beginning of the decade in which I will retire and, all being well, I have five years more. So as we begin our work, we need to face into planning positively for those five years: identifying priorities and fragilities, and doing all we can within our means to grow the churches in their depth, their strength, their resilience, their vision, and their mission.

HELEN MARGARET THOMPSON

Known to us all as Margaret, was born on the 19th January 1934. She lived in Shipbourne all her life, first at Little Budds, then Marchurst and finally her beloved Peacocks.

She was at Walthamstow Hall with Sheran Cazalet (the late sister of Edward) and was a guest at her wedding at St Giles in 1968.

She was devoted to St Giles and attended every Sunday (woe betide any Rector or reader who did not 'speak up'). She served on the PCC for many years and was a Churchwarden from 1996 to 2004.

Margaret was an accomplished rider, having started at an early age and continuing for the rest of her life. She competed in endurance riding, jumping and dressage and anyone who had been to Peacocks will have noticed the many trophies she won. At the age of 90 she was still hacking out her much loved horse, Toby, several times a week. She was an early member of the Sevenoaks Riding Club where she went on to become President, a position she held until she died.

She was a staunch supporter of the Kent Wildlife Trust. She volunteered for many years at Bough Beech Reservoir and served on the local committee. She loved barn owls and successfully hatched many in a box in her top field

She was Head Teacher at Hever School for 15 years until circa 1991 and rumour had it that she commuted there on a Lambretta!

Margaret had been President of Shipbourne WI and until 2024 went on their monthly walks with Alfie, her dog, and rarely missed the pub lunches afterwards.

For several years she ran Scottish Dancing in the village hall and proved herself to be a formidable teacher. She also hosted fortnightly Scrabble at Peacocks - no quarter given!

Margaret loved this village, St Giles, her horses, Toby and Scarlet, and her little dog, Alfie. And being the person she was she made arrangements for these three to be cared for after her death.

She spent the last few days of her life as she would have wished. She was at St Giles on Sunday (after a short time in hospital and then convalescing) when she was given a warm welcome by the congregation. On Monday she watched the VE Day celebrations on television, and on Tuesday she died in her garden.

Her funeral will be held at St Giles on Wednesday 18th June, at 2 o'clock.

OUR RESTORATION PROJECT IS FINISHED ... FOR NOW!

The second phase of the restoration of St Giles' church is now complete, apart from some minor snagging. The first phase, rewiring the crypt and installing a sump pump to prevent flooding, was completed in January last year and I am pleased to say that the crypt has since stayed dry. The second phase, restoring the exterior of the building, was finished early this year and we held a service of celebration which many of you attended on 23 March.

This major building project, which cost a total of around £270,000, has been a significant undertaking for those of us involved in raising the money, getting the necessary permissions and providing the client function, alongside our architect. One thing we have learnt is that until the scaffolding is up and you can get close to the building, you cannot know exactly what needs to be done. Some things we expected to have to do proved not to be necessary, others things which had to be done were not visible from the ground: for instance, the stonework around the clockface on the tower proved to be in very poor condition and had to be extensively repaired.


We had both good and bad luck. We were very lucky not to be affected by the Government's recent decision to limit grants to reimburse churches for VAT on repairs: if we had been doing the project now, that decision would have added £20,000 to our costs. And we were lucky in the great generosity of the congregation and local people, which made raising the money so much easier than we had expected at the outset. The bad luck was that we found woodworm in the roof and that we had to spend almost £7,000 on bat surveys and work to accommodate the single bat which was found roosting in the south transept roof. That bat is now royally housed, not only does it have a comfy bat box in one of the churchyard trees, it can also roost in the transept, which has a special breathable membrane under the tiles and a 'bat tile' which incorporates a slit to enable it to get in and out.

The most enjoyable aspect of the project for many of us was to see the splendid cross returned to the east gable of the chancel, the original having fallen in the 1960s. Watching Eugene, the stonemason, carving the cross was fascinating. Eugene also volunteered to piece together a finial from the reredos behind the altar inside the church which had fallen a few years ago and smashed on the floor. He was able to stick the 17 alabaster fragments together with resin. The finial is now back in place and you would not know that it had been so severely damaged.

In due course we hope to move on to the third phase of our project which will involve replacing part of the tiled dado on the south wall of the nave, part of which has fallen off (luckily, the firm which made the tiles in 1881 is still in business and should be able to replicate them for us) and restoring the damaged wall-paintings in the chancel. Our fundraising last year was so successful that we exceeded our target and have a substantial sum left over which we can put towards these internal works.

We may think that we have almost finished: certainly, the work we have just done, together with the reroofing of the nave and repair of the top of the tower in 2008, have put the exterior of the church in a very good state of repair. But all buildings decay. There will come a time when our successors will need another repair campaign, for instance to reroof the chancel and north transept, both of which still have their original tiles of 1881. This is the price of having one of the best Victorian churches in Kent in our midst for our use and enjoyment and I hope that it is a price that future generations will be prepared to pay, as you have done. Thank you.





THE ALLCORN BUILDERS OF PLAXTOL AND SHIPBOURNE

Just as landscape can shape communities so members of the community can influence and reinforce the distinctive character of that landscape. And in Plaxtol and Shipbourne skilled family firms have over the years built in harmony with the landscape using local brick, stone and tile.

A family of master bricklayers and builders who have lived in these and surrounding parishes since at least the late 1700's is that of the Allcorns, whose work has done much to reinforce our sense of place.

William Allcorn, b.1819, Sarah Sophia his wife and their six children lived in St Giles Cottage, School Lane – then called Plaxtol Lane of which it is a logical continuation – Shipbourne, one of whom was their son Jonathan born in 1858.

In 1877 William built Ashenden Cottage, Plaxtol as a lodge for Ashenden and rebuilt the Gothic revival church of St Giles in Shipbourne for Edward Cazalet in 1879, completing it within 18 months. It replaced the Palladian church of 1722 by Gibbs and when Jonathan, a joiner, built a house in School Lane, Shipbourne for himself and his wife Elizabeth in 1903 he named it The Pinnacles after two of the corner posts from the original church tower and steeple that still top the gate posts there.

William's brother, Stephen Allcorn, b.1810 - also a master bricklayer and builder - lived in Plaxtol. He and his family lived originally in Dunks Green then near the Tiger's Head in The Street - where Trent House & High Weald now stand - then in a private house in Red Lion Square and latterly Pickwick Cottage and finally Southview, Plaxtol.

The Plaxtol Allcorn builders - Stephen and his son William, b.1845 - are perhaps most well-known for the red brick terrace of houses in Dunks Green known as Chapel Cottages. It was William and Sarah Ann Bennett's son, Frederick Percy Allcorn, a carpenter, who is commemorated on the Plaxtol WW1 Memorial.

The Shipbourne Allcorn builders are known to have built not only St Giles Church but also The Church of the Good Shepherd in Borough Green. In addition to The Pinnacles, in 1906 Jonathan built a detached three storey butcher's shop – with a slaughter house behind - at the top of The Street in Plaxtol where much of the tiled frontage remains. When two of his sisters married Feldon brothers - both widowers - around the turn of the 20th century he named the terraced cottages he built next to the shop in The Street, Feldon Cottages.

Jonathan's son, William John, b.1890, built – amongst other houses - Maddox Cottages in Crouch, named after the London Street in which he trained as an architect and extended the end terraced Rose Cottage on Church Hill erecting a plaque, JA & EA 1923, in honour of his parents. He and his wife Ruth lived at The Pinnacles, Shipbourne and brought up their four children there, one of whom we know as Mary Wells.

JUNE AT SHIPBOURNE FARMERS MARKET (Local produce made/grown by Local producers)

After weeks of sunshine together with a very cold wind, which really kept the number of visitors down the wind has died down and we are now hoping for mush better numbers at the Farmers' Market.

Sid of **Caffezhino** has changed her business and is now concentrating on importing and exporting coffee beans from the High Andes. The Church Co-operative Stall are now stocking her four most popular coffee blends. If we are missing your favourite please let us know and we can add it in to our next order. As our overheads are much less we have also reduced the prices!

We are welcoming **Hadlow College** to the Market who will be bringing a selection of vegetable plants plus their own apple juice. So together with Jo's flowers and flowering plants we now have the 'Shipbourne Nursery'!

The benefits of buying locally at Farmers' Markets means that not only do you get the chance to taste before you buy but by going directly to the source you can find out at first hand how the produce was grown or made. In addition, our producers are able to give you storing and cooking tips so you can really make the most of your purchase.

With the cost of food increasing, remember that when you are buying locally and seasonally, pricing is now very competitive with supermarkets and often cheaper so don't fall for the idea that shopping at Farmers' Markets is an expensive luxury.

The **Asparagus** season is in full swing and picking will finish by the end of the month to allow the plants to generate growth for next year, so make the most of the green spears while they are around now. Eat your local asparagus traditionally, steamed and served with melted butter, or brush with olive oil and griddle the spears on the barbecue until tender then scattered with shavings of a sharp hard cheese.

Other veg to look out for are crisp radishes, spring onions, spinach, and of course new potatoes. There are also early

cucumbers, runner beans, spinach and courgettes, alongside all kinds of salad leaves now in season.

Warm weather means BBQ time! Kieron now has a great choice of sausages from Old English, venison, wild boar and apple together with venison and wild boar burgers, perfect for the coals.

We are entering **berry** season - a favourite way to serve **raspberries**, **cherries** and **strawberries** is to crush them slightly, sprinkle with a little cherry brandy and sugar, leave for an hour, then serve with vanilla ice cream.

STRAWBERRY SUMMER GIN

Perfect for a gin & tonic or as a base for a fruity cocktail

Easy / Makes 1.5 litres / 15 mins prep plus 3 weeks infusing

- 700ml bottle of gin
- 400g strawberries, sliced
- 100g caster sugar
- 1. Mix the gin with the strawberries and sugar in a large bowl
- 2. Pour into a 1.5 litre sterilised Kilner jar
- 3. Store in the fridge and stir every two days for three weeks
- 4. Strain through coffee filters or muslin cloth to serve
