

SAINTS' DAYS A-PLENTY...

My little articles are always, to some extent, about the calendar, and the life of the church is very much based on the calendar. Not just twelve months or thirteen moons in a year, but the various festivals, seasons... and Saints' days. Some years we can go right through the summer without a Saints' day falling on a Sunday, but this year we've had three:



St Bartholmew, Apostle (Aug 24th), St Aidan, Bishop (Aug 31st) and St Matthew, Apostle and Gospel writer (Sept 21st). Looking forward into the autumn: St Michael and All Angels (Sept 29th) and All Saints' day (Nov 1st).

All Saints' day, also known as 'All Hallows', is a day for any and all saints to be remembered, and it's where Hallowe'en gets its name from. The very next day is All Souls' day. This has traditionally been a day when we remember all our love ones who have died. In the Shardlake series of novels by C. J. Sansom, the hunched-back slooth-lawyer passes through Tonbridge on All Soul's day, and although this is set in the reign of Henry VIII who had just forced the English Reformation along by cutting ties with the Pope, granting himself a divorce, and creating the Church of England, the locals are still keep All Souls' day in a very Roman Catholic way with Requiem Masses to get the souls of their loved ones out of purgatory and into heaven.

This year we will keep both All Saints' day and All Souls' day on Sunday 2nd November. In our evening service (6.00pm at Plaxtol) we will call out the names of those we have loved and lost as we remember and give thanks for their lives, their faith and their example. So, in the couple of weeks leading up to this, in the latter part of October, there will be lists in church where you are invited to add names of your loved ones who have died. We seem to have lost a more than usually high number of church members in the last month, so I'm anticipating that the service will be quite moving.

Nonetheless, all welcome!

Asian Hornets

Reports locally about sightings of Asian hornets have resulted in a couple of traps being placed in the hall garden earlier in September. To date these haven't delivered any Asian Hornets, which is a good thing, although a nest was located and destroyed in Plaxtol on the weekend of 13/14th September.

If you spot an Asian Hornet, it is important to report the sighting and not kill individual hornets. These are being tracked as they are very aggressive and destroy our native honeybees. By tracking them it is hoped their nests can be found and destroyed.

Colder days are ahead. Good luck for a winter of warm houses, to all.

However... if your boiler breaks down, please think about installing a heat pump. No oil and no LPG! CASP can help you with useful links and advice on grants available. Email: info@casphub.org Several villagers have already installed heat pumps and/or PV panels. We will be putting their stories up on our website. Here is one:

Experience of installing photovoltaic panels and switching from an oil boiler to an air source heat pump.

<u>Photovoltaic panels:</u> In 2011, we installed a 4 kW photovoltaic system on a south-facing roof. Since installation, the system has run without issue and generated over 55,000 kWh of electricity. Generation levels are highest in the summer, lower in the winter, non-existent in thick fog or snow.

Verdict: The photovoltaic system is brilliant.

With hindsight what would we change: We would add a storage battery to end dependence on the grid for evening and overnight electricity.

<u>Air source heat pump:</u> In 2022, we replaced a 35-year-old oil boiler with an air source heat pump as a retrofit which included an upgrade of all the radiators and the hot water tank. There were issues on installation. The system sprang two leaks: the first, caused by possible damage to a radiator pipe; the second, caused by a substandard joint in a previous plumbing repair. Both problems were resolved in a couple of weeks and since then the system has run without issue.

The biggest adjustment was accepting that the radiators were not hot, only warm to touch. We were encouraged to keep internal doors open and to maintain the entire house at an even temperature (our preference is between 15 and 18°C depending on the weather) whereas previously less-used rooms would have had the radiators switched off in winter and the doors closed. The increased internal airflow has meant that no cold or damp areas have been noted since installation.

Verdict: The air source heat pump works well. There is always hot water. When the outside temperature drops below zero, the increased demand for electricity is clearly visible on the smart meter. At this point we sometimes use a couple of stand-alone radiators to boost heat in the rooms we are using.

With hindsight what would we change: We would add more insulation so that we wouldn't lose the heat from the house quite so quickly when it's bitterly cold outside.

FROM YOUR LOCAL MP

I have a strong desire for more buses serving our community. One of the ways you can ensure our bus services are as good as they can be is by letting me know any issues or concerns you may have. I am always interested to hear the experiences of anyone who uses our local bus routes, including our children.

That's why I run a School Bus Survey each year. With the new academic year having now started I have opened my 2025 survey to find out which services are working well, and which need improvement over the first few weeks of term. If you, or someone you know, has children of secondary school age, please ask them to complete my annual survey so they can have their say. I also would like to hear from anyone who has children of secondary school age who could get the bus to school, but choose not to. Why is that, and what would make you consider getting a bus to school instead?

Autumn is always a tricky time for any parent, with our children going into a new school year and sometimes a new school entirely. This brings a change to the routine and our travel plans too. With this being the case it's more important than ever to let me know your thoughts so that I can raise these with the relevant operators and Kent County Council. I meet regularly with our local bus companies and I am able to raise these issues with them directly.

THE ORIGINAL FAYRE LANE

In the sitcom, *To the Manor Born*, it is not the character Audrey Fforbes-Hamilton and the large manor house that embodies the medieval definition of the word Manor: it is Del Boy in *Only Fools & Horses*. When he boasts "not in my manor" he means not on my patch; he is referring to an area of land over which he considers he has influence, rights and privileges.

A manor is a legal term for a parcel of land granted by the king to the lord, generally before 1290. The lord had, thereafter, the right to hold a manorial court called a court baron. This was the lowest court of law in England used to enforce the feudal services owed to the lord of the manor by his tenants.

In 1250 there were two manors in Shipbourne - those of Shipborne and Shipborne Puttenden – which were granted to Sir Roger de Bavent. The Culpepper family held the manors in frank fee for the Bavents but after Sir Richard's death, in 1358, his widow, Hawise, relinquished her rights to the manors to the Priory at Dartford.

During the 15th the Chowne family owned the medieval house often associated with the manor of Shipbourne. Sited south of Round Shaw near the River Bourne moated remains of such a house with its fishponds and earthworks have been found. The scant – practically invisible – remains have been a Heritage Monument since 1977. It was possibly the Chownes that then built the mansion house – first called Chownys then Fayre Lane - further up the hill in Plaxtol parish, probably a warmer, dryer spot than that of the original house in the river valley.

However, the manors themselves continued to be part of the possessions of the Priory until after the dissolution of the monasteries when in 1545 Henry VIII granted both manors to Sir Ralph Fane. His descendent, Sir Henry Vane, Secretary of State to King Charles I, was born and lived in his mansion in Hadlow. Then, around 1630, he bought the mansion of Fairlawn in Plaxtol from the Chowne family.

Finally, an impressive mansion house existed for the Lord of the Manor of Shipbourne, even if it was not actually in the manor. However there had always been a house associated with the Manor of Shipbourne Puttenden. In 1175 a farmhouse known as

Puttenden was situated in a 'den' in the Manor of Wrotham. And there is evidence that Puttenden Manor Farm was inhabited in 1198.

Although the house known as Puttenden Manor dates from the early medieval period it is listed as an 18th century farmhouse because it has undergone many transformations, period refurbishments and enlargements. The house was usually tenanted but after the Second World War (when it was a dairy farm) the Cazalets - owners of the Fairlawne Estate at the time and Lords of the Manors of Shipbourne and Shipbourne Puttenden – sited the kennels for the West Kent Hounds there. To this day, Fairlawne and Puttenden Manor remain an historical link to our manorial past.

OCTOBER AT SHIPBOURNE FARMERS' MARKET

Local produce made/grown by Local producers

The summer is well and truly over when it comes to food, so it's the month to rediscover the delights of colder weather eating with all the wonderful harvest of ingredients at our disposal. Our fresh fruit and vegetables are at their best. Onions, leeks, beetroot, carrots and tomatoes are all full of flavour at this time of year whilst the wonderful array of squashes and pumpkins offer so much more for the cook than just as lanterns for Halloween. Root vegetables such as parsnip, swede and celeriac are all wonderful roasted or mashed and perfect with new season's game. Use them in soups, stews, curries and pickles for rich seasonal colour and taste. Kentish cobnuts, walnuts, hazelnuts and chestnuts have been harvested – try them now when they are 'wet' and discover a whole new intensity of flavour. Use in autumn salads or scattered on meringues and in fruit compote - delicious.

We have a much larger variety of apples at the market than at supermarkets so try different varieties. Bramleys for cooking – it's definitely crumble season - and making into chutneys and jellies to enjoy through the winter. The later ripening varieties are good for keeping so you will be able to enjoy from now until next summer. Plums will finish soon but autumn fruiting raspberries are still available.

Much of our seafood is at its best caught from colder waters so as the sea temperature drops this month, fish just gets better and better. Sea bass, haddock and Dover sole will be fishing well. Remember the better the quality of the fish, the simpler it needs to be cooked.

The changing season herald a longing for richer, more comforting meat dishes and it's the start of the game season with pheasant appearing once again at the market. Use it as chicken – cubed breast meat works perfectly in curries, stir fries or just marinate the whole breasts and cook on the griddle. Lean and tender, it suits quick cooking methods such as frying and grilling. Try with mushrooms, the perfect partner for seasonal game

COOKERY CORNER

SILKY SQUASH RISOTTO

Serves 4 / not too tricky

- 1 butternut squash (1.2 kg)
- 1 bunch of fresh marjoram (20g)
- · Rapeseed oil
- 1.2 litres vegetable or chicken stock
- 1 onion
- 1 stick of celery
- 300g Arborio risotto rice
- 150ml dry white wine
- ½ a lemon
- 50g parmesan cheese
- 1 knob of unsalted butter
- 1. Preheat the oven to 180c/350f/gas 4. Scrub the squash (there's no need to peel it), carefully halve it lengthways and de-seed, then chop into 2cm chunks (the seeds can be roasted and sprinkled on top).
- 2. Place the squash in a roasting tray, pick and chop most of the marjoram leaves, then toss with 1 tablespoon of olive oil or rapeseed oil and a pinch of sea salt and black pepper. Roast for 1 hour or until soft and caramelised.
- 3. With 20 minutes to go on the squash, simmer the stock over a low heat. Peel and finely chop the onion and celery, then place in a high-sided pan on a medium heat with ½ a tablespoon of rapeseed oil. Cook for 10 minutes, or until softened but not coloured, stirring regularly, then stir in the rice to toast for 2 minutes.
- 4. Pour in the wine and stir until absorbed. Add a ladleful of stock and wait until it's been fully absorbed before adding another, stirring constantly and adding ladles of stock until the rice is cooked. It will need 16-18 minutes.
- 5. Remove the squash from the oven and mash up with a fork, leaving some chunky pieces. Stir through the risotto about halfway through.
- 6. When the risotto is done, add enough extra stock or boiling kettle water to make the risotto oozy, then finely grate in the parmesan and beat in the butter.
- 7. Cover the pan, turn off the heat and leave to relax for 2 minutes. Stir, season and plate up sprinkling the remaining marjoram leaves and roasted seeds on top. Delicious topped with tenderstem broccoli or crispy pancetta.
