

### WHOSE FLAG IS IT ANYWAY?

You may or may not have noticed, but it suddenly seems trendy to fly a flag. What's it all about? The simple answer, at least on the news, seems to be 'It's patriotic!' – but what does that really mean? I'm concerned that it's a fairly poor excuse for racism and xenophobia, an inarticulate and misguided way of protesting about our out-of-



control immigration system. But whose flag is it? St George's! Where's he from? Georgia! I imagine myself asking St George himself, 'Where did you get you flag, saintly fellow, and what does it mean?' 'It's the banner of the resurrection!' 'Oh, I see, thanks!' So please don't misuse a symbol of hope for such a singular evil.

There have always been displaced people, foreigners, aliens. In some of the earliest known writings, which we now call the Old Testament, it is clear how people who had a relationship with God understood God's will on this matter: "When a foreigner resides among you in your land, do not mistreat them. The foreigner residing among you must be treated as your native-born. Love them as yourself." (Leviticus 19:33-34). That seems very simple and straightforward and yet I anticipate many 'Yes, but..' replies, because it's a complex issue. But we ought to strive a clear vision of the compassion that's needed in the face of the desperation of immigrants, and to put our efforts into solving the complexities, rather than demonising the vulnerable.

Flags will be flying, too, on November 9<sup>th</sup> (Remembrance Sunday) and on 11<sup>th</sup> (Armistice Day). Acts of Remembrance will take place, as usual, at the War Memorials in both villages, concurrently, beginning at 10.50am in time for the two minutes silence at 11.00am, both followed by a simple service in church.

Just in case you're a flag nerd, here's the local trivia – the flag we fly from both our churches has the badge of the Diocese of Rochester in the corner.

# Shipbourne School Bonfire and Fireworks Party Saturday 8<sup>th</sup> November 2025 4.15pm-6pm


Dear Shipbourne Resident,

# TONBRIDGE & MALLING BOROUGH COUNCIL PUBLIC SPACE PROTECTION ORDER CONSULTATION (PSPO)

The current PSPO is due to expire in April 2026, and TMBC are proposing to renew the existing restrictions while introducing a few additional measures to further support community safety.

### Proposed Changes:

We intend to retain all current restrictions and add the following:

- A new restriction to prevent misuse of catapults.
- A new restriction to prevent unauthorised camping in the. Memorial Gardens, Tonbridge.
- A slight amendment to the existing drone restriction, clarifying that unauthorised drones must not be launched or landed on any land owned by the Borough Council.

We welcome views/feedback from all members of the community including Parish Councils, and your feedback will help shape the final version of the PSPO.

The consultation period runs from Monday 15 September to midnight on Sunday 2 November.

They adapt well to their habitat and will hunt whatever they can find—from mammals such as water voles and rabbits to water birds like moorhens and kingfishers, as well as frogs and fish. Because mink are an invasive species with no natural predators in the UK to keep their population in check, our wildlife urgently needs our help. Mink have been sighted in our area. ### FROM YOUR LOCAL MP

All of us enjoy the quiet beauty of our countryside - the walks across the Downs/Weald, the still mornings, and the sense of calm that defines our corner of Kent. That's why the Government's decision to approve a second runway at Gatwick Airport will come as such a disappointment to so many of us.

I will continue to stand alongside the many local campaigners who have spent years working to defend our countryside and our communities. Growth in aviation should bring benefits to those who live nearby as well as to the industry itself - and at present, that balance has not been struck.

For us in Shipbourne, you might ask why this matters? The community I represent goes as far south as Penshurst and Hever. These villages, primarily between Tonbridge and Edenbridge, suffer greatly from noise and environmental issues caused by being directly under the flightpath. Much of this area is a designated National Landscape, recognised for its beauty and importance. If this were a motorway on the ground, it would never be approved.

The airport stands to see a major increase in passenger numbers, but there remains no commitment to reinstate the direct rail link from Kent to Gatwick - something I believe should be in place before any expansion is allowed to operate. I made this point clearly at the public inquiry, along with the need for stricter limits on night flights, stronger protections from aircraft noise, and firm commitments to reduce the carbon impact of the airport. These are not unreasonable requests. They are essential safeguards for those of us who live beneath the flight paths and who already feel the strain of existing traffic in our skies.

Despite my concern at the decision, I will continue to work to try and secure a direct rail link. The work to date shows this coming to Tonbridge, which is much easier to get to than Hildenborough Station. This would help ease traffic on the



### THE SUNKEN LANES OF PLAXTOL & SHIPBOURNE

The weather in 2025 may have been disastrous for local farmer's crops but it has been a bumper year for apples, pears and plums; chestnuts, beech mast and acorns. For oak trees this year of plenty is known as a 'mast year' - which only occurs every five years or so – when the energy stored up by the trees produces an abundance of acorns which are rich in energy.

In the ninth century Manors were awarded large stretches of forests for grazing swine or for collecting wood. These were called 'dens' and were connected to the parent manor by a drove way. Drove ways, both narrow or wide, would have had an influence on the positioning of the church and - for obvious reasons - farmsteads, husbandmen's cottages and drinking establishments were built close to them.

Many of the sunken lanes that wind through Plaxtol and Shipbourne were used as drove ways. In Saxon times herdsmen from Aylesford made use of these ways to move their pigs for pannage to the dens where they were fattened on acorns and beechmast before being taken to market.

An ancient drove way from Oldbury past Ightham Mote to Budds Green led onto dens at Hildenborough and further to Hayesden. Others from Aylesford came down the drove ways from Crouch to Dunks Green in Plaxtol and from there on down to the dens at Puttenden for final fattening before reaching the market at Tonbridge.

The roads we know to have been long distance drove ways were wide enough to take large numbers of livestock to markets – sometimes over weeks - for sale or slaughter many miles away in large towns and cities. But, locally, farmers moved their livestock from field to field via narrow sunken lanes and herded cattle raised in Plaxtol and sheep that grazed the fields of Shipbourne to the local market town of Tonbridge.

These narrow, ancient sunken lanes – surfaces eroded over the centuries by thousands of feet both two and four legged – are most easily recognised today as single track roads with high, steep banks. They are most obvious on the hills of the parishes and are often accompanied by a tunnel of trees overhead. Mote Road and

Sheet Hill are lanes that most locals today would recognize as ancient sunken lanes.

And there are other sunken paths in the parishes known as 'holloways' - such as that from Spinners Wents to Rats Castle in Plaxtol - narrower tracks still through our woodland and bordering our fields worn away through centuries of use as footpaths and bridleways and the water that inevitably runs down them.

Long distance droving slowly came to a halt with the advent of the railways but the increase in motorized vehicles after WWII has meant that livestock rarely tread our sunken lanes. Lanes which, nevertheless, continue to make such a special contribution to the character of our villages and landscape.

# NOVEMBER AT SHIPBOURNE FARMERS' MARKET

### Local produce made/grown by Local producers

Clocks have now gone back and Autumn moves towards the depths of Winter, appetites change as, with the shortening days, we all crave a little comfort. Slow-cooked casseroles, satisfyingly starchy creamy mashes, rich flavoured roasts and warming puds all fit the bill perfectly so wrap up and head out for a trip to the Market for inspiration.

Game is the meat of choice for cooks in November as the season is well under way for birds such as pheasant, partridge and wild duck as well as venison and rabbit are available. Our new pie-maker, Liz, has now added venison pies to her popular menu (her Shipbourne Pasty is also always worth a try, whatever the season!).

Root vegetables are at their tastiest now and perfect for mashes, gratins and soups – they improve with the cold and you will notice a marked difference in flavour compared to supermarket specimens. Look out for parsnips, Jerusalem artichokes, swede and turnips. Main crop potatoes are full of texture and flavour and the varieties available locally are worth exploring. Brassicas really come into their own this month too – kale, Spring greens and all kinds of cabbages are wonderful in stir-fries, soups, and hashes or just steamed with grated nutmeg and more butter! And red cabbage cooked with apple, spices and red wine is another seasonal treat to go with rich pork, or maybe a roasted wild duck.

Colder waters make for high quality fish and seafood, and as the temperature drops the range available just gets better. At the luxury end of the scale Dover sole, turbot and halibut are rightly considered the very finest eating. Lower cost alternatives are also at their best. Brill is a firm white flesh full of clean flavour that only needs simple cooking. Or opt for healthy mackerel, full of valuable Omega 3 fish oils.

Bramleys are perfect for using in mincemeat and Christmas pudding so buy them ready for stir up Sunday at the end of the month. The eating varieties can be used in tarts and cakes or covered in chocolate or caramel for a bonfire night treat!

### **COOKERY CORNER**

### **BONFIRE NIGHT BAKED POTATOES**

Serves 4 / Preparation: 15 minutes / Cooking: 1hr 30mins

### **Ingredients:**

- 4 medium baking potatoes
- 2 tbsp rapeseed oil
- 25g butter
- 1 large onion finely sliced
- 6 slices smoked streaky bacon, chopped
- 2 tbsp double cream
- 200g mixed good melting cheese e.g. reblochon, raclette or gruyere
- Chopped parsley

#### Method:

- 1. Heat oven to 200 C / 180 C fan /gas mark 6. Prick potatoes all over with a fork, then rub with half the oil, some sea salt and black pepper.
- 2. Arrange on a baking tray and bake in the oven for 1hr 15 mins, until their skins are crisp and they are completely tender when prodded.
- 3. Meanwhile heat the remaining oil and half the butter in a frying pan. Add the onion and gently cook for 15-20 mins until softened and golden. Remove from the pan and set aside, add the chopped bacon and fry until just crisp. Remove using a slotted spoon and place on kitchen paper.
- 4. Halve each potato lengthways, then scoop out most of the potato into a bowl, leaving a potato skin shell with a thin layer of potato. In the bowl, crush the potato with the remaining butter and the double cream. Season with salt and pepper. Fold through the onion, bacon, three quarters of the cheeses and half the parsley. Spoon back into the potato shells and top with the remaining cheese. Transfer to the baking tray and return to the oven for 10-15 minutes, until melting and golden.
- 5. Sprinkle with the rest of the parsley, serve with a crisp salad.
